HRPF'S EFFORTS ABOUT RISING CRIME RATE IN POLICE STATION KUTHIYALA SHEIKHAN DISTRICT M.B.DIN.

Human Rights Protection Foundation (HRPF) has formally raised concerns

with the Inspector General of Punjab Police regarding the alarming rise in serious crimes in Police Station Kuthiyala Sheikhan, Mandi Bahauddin. Reports indicate that investigating officers are failing to cooperate with complainants and are allegedly filing false challans in robbery cases, further deteriorating the law and order situation.

In response, the Inspector

General Punjab Police appointed SSP(IAB) Gujranwala as Inquiry Officer. During the inquiry, HRPF Chairman and several complainants recorded their statements, leading to comprehensive investigations into the matter. Subsequently, SSP(IAB) Gujranwala submitted a detailed inquiry report to AIG(Inspection) Punjab Police, Lahore.

However, when HRPF formally requested a certified copy of the inquiry report from the IAB Office Gujranwala, authorities refused to provide it. In light of this, HRPF has invoked the Right to

Information Act 2013 to demand certified copies of the report from AIG(Inspection) Lahore.

HRPF has now formally appealed to the Inspector General of Police, AIG Police,

and District Police Officer (DPO) Mandi Bahauddin to ensure justice for the complainants and take necessary action in accordance with the findings of the official inquiry report.

HRPF remains committed to defending human rights and will continue utilizing all available resources for the service of humanity.

HRPF ANYALYSIS REPORT ABOUT THE WORST SITUATION OF CRIME IN M.B.DIN THROUGH EXERCISING THE RIGHT TO INFORMATION ACT.

Grave Crime Situation in Mandi Bahauddin: HRPF Analytical Report Shared with Authorities

The Human Rights Protection Foundation (HRPF) has shared its analytical report on the alarming crime situation in Mandi Bahauddin with

senior officials and human rights organizations, highlighting concerns and providing recommendations.

Report Background:

Following the directives of the Honorable Chief Commissioner of the Punjab Information Commission, the HRPF requested crime

records from the District Police Officer (DPO) Mandi Bahauddin, covering January 1 to August 25, 2024. Key

statistics include:

1. Murder Cases: 91

2. Robbery Cases: 5

3. Land Grabbing Cases: 47

4. Other Moral Crimes: 8,226

5. Public Hearing Records (with implementation): 205

6. Complaints Registered: 5,723

7. Complaints Dismissed: 620

8. Action Against Police Officers (Under Section 155-C): None Key Findings:

1. Rising Murder Cases:

With 91 murders in just eight months, the situation demands immediate attention. The yearly projection is equally alarming.

2. High Moral and Land-Related Crimes:

8,226 moral crimes and 47 land-grabbing cases highlight a significant disruption to societal peace.

The dismissal of 620 complaints out of 5,723 reflects declining public trust.

3. Lack of Police Accountability:

Despite 205 public hearing cases, no action under Section 155-C has been taken against police officials, raising questions about transparency.

HRPF Recommendations:

1. Activate Peace Committees:

Empower district peace committees and involve scholars from all schools of thought to promote harmony.

2. Role of Civil Society:

Local organizations and the civil society must collaborate with authorities to curb crime.

3. Ensure Police Accountability:

Implement transparent mechanisms for police accountability and initiate

actions under Section 155-C.

4. Community Awareness Campaigns:

Launch awareness initiatives to educate the public about combating crime.


5. Strengthen Rule of Law:

Take immediate steps to ensure timely justice and uphold the rule of law.

Conclusion:

The HRPF is committed to restoring peace, ensuring justice, and protecting

human rights in Mandi Bahauddin. We urge the public, administration, and civil society to work together to curb rising crime rates.



INNOCENT PERSON KILLED BY MIANA GONDAL POLICE HRPF HIGHLIGHTED THIS ISSUE TO CONCERNED AUTHORITIES.

The recent killing of a citizen by police officers at Miana Gondal Police Station (FIR.1176/24 U/S 302, 34 PPC Police Station Miana Gondal Dist.M.B.Din.) Mandi Bahauddin is a grim reminder of the

deep-rooted issues plaguing the police department. The Human Rights Protection Foundation. expresses its

profound concern over this tragic incident, which highlights the urgent need for police reforms and accountability.

For years, our platform has consistently raised alarms about the deteriorating structure of the police department, particularly in Mandi Bahauddin. This incident reflects the consequences of a system hampered by political

interference, opaque recruitment processes, and the frequent transfer of officers with little understanding of the local context.

KEY CONCERNS:

1.POLITICAL INTERFERENCE:

The consistent meddling by political entities undermines the professionalism and independence of the police force. This interference

often leads to the appointment of officers based on favoritism rather than merit, weakening the department's credibility and effectiveness.

2.NON-TRANSPARENT APPOINTMENTS:

Officers appointed without a thorough evaluation of their qualifications and commitment to public service often lack the capacity to handle complex

and sensitive situations, leading to dire outcomes.

3.MISMANAGEMENT AND CONFUSION:

Newly appointed District Police Officers (DPOs) are frequently misled or overwhelmed by subordinate staff, hindering their ability to address pressing issues effectively. This confusion perpetuates a cycle of inefficiency and lack of accountability.

4.EROSION OF PUBLIC TRUST:

The blood-stained uniforms of martyrs from Mandi Bahauddin's police force symbolize the sacrifices made to uphold law and order. However, the repeated failures of the department tarnish their legacy and erode public trust in the police.

(RECOMMENDATIONS FOR REFORM)

To honor the sacrifices of the police martyrs and restore public confidence, the Punjab Police and the government must prioritize structural reforms:

1.MERIT-BASED APPOINTMENTS:

Introduce a transparent and merit-based system for the recruitment and appointment of police officers, free from political influence.

2.TRAINING AND CAPACITY BUILDING:

Implement rigorous training programs focused on human rights, conflict resolution, and community policing to equip officers with the necessary skills and sensitivity.

3.ACCOUNTABILITY MECHANISMS:

Establish independent oversight bodies to investigate misconduct and

ensure that officers who violate the law are held accountable.

4.EMPOWERING LEADERSHIP:

Provide newly appointed DPOs with comprehensive briefings and support systems to help them navigate the complexities of local issues without undue influence from subordinates. 5.COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT:

Foster collaboration between the police and local communities to rebuild trust and create a shared commitment to public safety.

A CALL TO ACTION

The Human Rights Protection Foundation urges senior officers of the Punjab Police to take immediate steps to address these issues. Let us ensure that the innocent blood spilled in

this recent tragedy and the sacrifices of the police martyrs in Mandi Bahauddin do not go in vain. The time for reform is now.

Together, we can work towards a police force that embodies justice, integrity, and professionalism.

•.INCIDENT DETAILS.

Near Bilal Pump, Mochiwala,

close to Basti Wahid Bakhsh Chachar, Moza Phul Lolai, a poor and helpless individual was subjected to brutal torture. The victim was tied with wires, hung upside down, and beaten with sticks and rods while fastened to a tower. His desperate cries for mercy, invoking the name of God and the Prophet (PBUH), fell on deaf ears. This inhumane act was allegedly committed by a

local landlord and two accomplices, who unlawfully assumed the roles of judge and executioner in a self-styled punishment for a suspected theft.



LAWLESSNESS IN MANDI BAHAUDDIN HRPF RAISES PUBLIC CONCERNS. AN OTHER INNOCENT CITIZEN TORTURED IN POLICE STATION GOJRA DISTRICT M.B.DIN,

In recent times, Mandi Bahauddin has been witnessing a disturbing surge in serious crimes and lawlessness, creating a sense of deprivation and insecurity among the local population. A particularly troubling incident surfaced recently when a video went viral showing the abuse of a

poor individual by influential figures at Gojra police station M.B.Din. The footage has sparked widespread outrage, underscoring the growing issues surrounding human rights violations and lack of accountability in the area.

The Human Rights Protection Foundation has strongly condemned this incident, highlighting it as a critical issue that poses a

question mark over the performance of the newly appointed District Police Officer (DPO) Mandi Bahauddin. The Foundation has also raised alarms with the Inspector General of Punjab Police, drawing attention to the increasing rate of serious crimes, with specific concerns about the deteriorating situation at Police Station Kuthiala Sheikhan.

In response, an Inquiry Officer (SSP IAB) Gujranwala has been appointed to look into the matter. Extensive documentary evidence has been provided by the Human Rights Protection Foundation in the interest of public welfare. This inquiry aims to scrutinize the causes behind rising lawlessness and suggest concrete measures to improve public safety in

Mandi Bahauddin.

To further promote transparency, the District Police Officer has been approached by the Foundation to provide certified information on crime statistics under the Right to Information Act 2013. The Punjab Information Commission has also issued an order mandating that the requested information be

shared with the Human Rights Protection Foundation, reinforcing the importance of public access to such data.

The Human Rights Protection Foundation has also reached out to the National Commission for Human Rights Pakistan - NCHR to address the perceived negligence by investigating officers. Notably, a case involving an attack on the residence of Mr. Kamran Hussain Makhdoom, Advocate the Foundation's Director(L), is under crutiny, and there is deep concern about the conduct of the officers involved.

For the residents of Mandi Bahauddin, the current law enforcement crisis reflects a failure in policing and judicial procedures. The daily incidents of violent

crime have fostered a sense of abandonment, as locals feel unprotected and unheard. As serious crimes continue to proliferate, the Human Rights Protection Foundation has called upon the District Police Officer and other law enforcement agencies to take decisive action. Improved training and strict adherence to police rules are necessary to ensure accountability,

transparency, and justice for all citizens.

The Foundation, committed to safeguarding human rights and promoting accountability, has taken steps to keep higher authorities informed. It hopes that these efforts will catalyze significant reforms and create a safer environment for the people of Mandi Bahauddin. This situation remains a pressing

issue, and all eyes are on the response of both the local police leadership and higher provincial authorities to restore law and order in the district.

HUMAN RIGHTS PROTECTION FOUNDATION PAKISTAN HAS DEEP CONCERNS REGARDING FALSE FIR REGISTERED AGAINST THE CHIEF EDITOR DAILY BAZPURS M.B.DIN FIR NO.544/24 U/S 386 PPC CITY POLICE STATION M.B.DIN.(HRPF)

Human Rights Protection Foundation Pakistan has deep concerns over the false and fabricated FIR registertered against the Chief Editor of Daily Bazpurs, Mandi Bahauddin. (FIR NO.544/24 U/S 386 PPC city Police stationM.B.Din.)

Such baseless accusations not only threaten the

individual's reputation and safety but also undermine the fundamental principles of press freedom and human rights.

Human Rights Protection Foundation Pakistan strongly condemns this egregious act and urges immediate intervention from the relevant authorities. HRPF have already forwarded concerns to the Punjab Police higher

authorities, the Ministry of Human Rights, the National Commission for Human Rights, and international organizations dedicated to safeguarding human and journalistic rights.

HRPF implore the worthy DPO Mandi Bahauddin to personally oversee the investigation of this matter with the utmost impartiality and diligence. It is imperative that justice

prevails, and those responsible for filing this false case are held accountable to prevent such incidents from recurring.

HRPF stand firm in commitment to uphold the rights of journalists and defend the freedom of the press. It is crucial that the integrity of

Mandi Bahauddin Police remains untarnished, and swift action may kindly be taken to dismiss this baseless case and restore the justice.



HRPF EFFORTS FOR TRANSPARENCY IN THE INSTITUTIONS CASE FORWARDED TO NAB.

Human Rights Protection Foundation (HRPF) is committed to upholding human rights and ensuring transparency in institutions across the country.

In this regard, the foundation recently raised concerns with the National Accountability Bureau (NAB) against SDO Construction

GEPCO Phalia regarding corruption within the institution and departmental audit objections against the said officer. HRPF also informed the Secretary of the Power Division in Islamabad and senior GEPCO officials about these irregularities.


Under the Right to Information Act, HRPF formally requested certified information from the concerned officer. However, the officer refused to provide the requested details. As a result, HRPF filed a petition with the Chief Commissioner

of the Pakistan Information Commission, urging him to issue orders for the provision of the required information. In response, the Chief Commissioner directed the GEPCO Chief in Gujranwala to provide the necessary records to HRPF. Failure to comply or any further delay could result in severe penalties for the responsible officers.

It is important to clarify that

HRPF has no personal enmity with any officer or individual. This effort is solely for public interest and the welfare of the people. Such initiatives may cause discomfort to some individuals, and some may take offense, but our goal is to seek the pleasure of Allah and contribute to national welfare. Even if some people become displeased, we believe that standing before

the Almighty on the Day of Judgment with a clear conscience is all that truly matters.



DISEASE SURVEY REPORT IN SIALKOT RECORD SOUGHT FROM EDO HEALTH SIALKOT.

The Human Rights Protection Foundation (HRPF) requested information under The Right To Information Act, 2013 from the Chief Executive Officer of the District Health Authority, Sialkot. This report outlines the health and disease conditions in various regions of Sialkot based on data collected from January 2024 to April 2024. The purpose of this

report is to analyze and highlight significant trends, and to raise concerns regarding the health status in the district.

Data Summary:

The following data was provided by the District Health Authority, Sialkot:

- Pneumonia: 932 cases

- Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD):

14,065 cases

- Seasonal Influenza: 10 cases

- Cutaneous Leishmaniasis: 5 cases

Gastroenteritis: 28,805 casesBloody Diarrhea: 1,892 casesTyphoid Fever: 1,681 cases

Trachoma: 439 casesGlaucoma: 441 cases

- Acute Conjunctivitis: 785 cases

Goiter: 137 casesEpilepsy: 86 casesDog Bite: 326 casesHIV/AIDS: 1 caseStroke: 1,056 cases

Analysis and Concerns:

1. Gastroenteritis (28,805 cases):

- The extremely high number of gastroenteritis cases is alarming and indicates potential issues with water and food sanitation in the region.
- Immediate steps are necessary to assess and improve water quality and food safety measures.
- 2. Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD) (14,065 cases):
- The high prevalence of COPD cases suggests significant air quality issues, potentially linked to industrial pollution or high smoking rates.
- Implementation of air pollution control measures and anti-smoking campaigns could be beneficial.
- 3. Pneumonia (932 cases) and Seasonal Influenza (10 cases):
- Respiratory infections continue to be a concern, especially among vulnerable populations such as the elderly and children.
- Strengthening vaccination programs and public health campaigns on respiratory hygiene are recommended.
- 4. Typhoid Fever (1,681 cases) and Bloody Diarrhea (1,892 cases):
- There is a pressing need to address issues related to clean drinking water and overall sanitation.
- Establishing better sewage systems and promoting hygiene practices can help reduce these numbers.
- 5. Trachoma (439 cases) and Glaucoma (441 cases):
- Eye health appears to be a significant concern, with a notable number of cases concerning preventable or treatable conditions.
- Initiatives for regular eye check-ups and public awareness campaigns on eye care should be considered.
- 6. Cutaneous Leishmaniasis (5 cases):
- Although the number of cases is relatively low, it indicates the presence of disease vectors such as sandflies in the region.
- Vector control programs and public education on preventive measures are essential.
- 7. Stroke (1,056 cases) and Epilepsy (86 cases):
- Neurological conditions, including strokes, indicate the need for better management of lifestyle diseases like hypertension and diabetes.

- Integrating neurological care into primary health care and screening programs is critical.
- 8. Dog Bite (326 cases):
- Rabies risk linked to dog bites necessitates better control of stray dog populations and public education on rabies prevention.
- Vaccination programs for dogs and rapid response initiatives for dog bite incidents should be strengthened.
- 9. HIV/AIDS (1 case):
- Even though there is only one reported case of HIV/AIDS, continuous efforts in awareness, testing, and counseling services are vital to prevent further spread.

Recommendations:
□ Enhance water and sanitation infrastructure to reduce cases of
gastroenteritis, typhoid fever, and diarrhea.
 Implement stricter air quality control measures and conduct public health awareness campaigns to combat COPD and other
respiratory diseases.
 Promote and provide vaccinations and public health education to minimize
the impact of infectious diseases like pneumonia and influenza.
□ Launch targeted health programs focusing on eye care and
regular screenings for conditions like trachoma and glaucoma.
☐ Improve the management and control of neurological disorders
through primary health care integration and public awareness.
□ Strengthen vector control
programs and public education on the prevention of diseases like
Cutaneous Leishmaniasis.
□ Enhance rabies vaccination programs for both the human
population and stray dogs, coupled with public awareness
campaigns on dog bite prevention and treatment.
☐ Maintain and expand programs for regular HIV/AIDS testing and
counseling
to ensure early detection and prevention.

Conclusion:

The health data from January 2024 to April 2024 reveals several pressing public health challenges in the Sialkot region. The high prevalence of gastroenteritis, COPD, and waterborne diseases, in


particular, warrants immediate attention. Addressing these concerns

through improved sanitation, air quality control, vaccination drives, and educational programs will be crucial to enhancing the overall health status of Sialkot residents.

Action Required:

We urge the District Health Authority to prioritize resources and interventions targeting these critical health issues. By working together, we can foster a

healthier environment and significantly reduce the burden of disease in the Sialkot region.



HRPF FILED A CASE BEFORE HONORABLE PROVINCIAL OMBUDSMAN ABOUT WATER POLUTION.

The Human Rights Protection Foundation (HRPF) submitted representations to the

Secretary of Environment Punjab, Secretary of Livestock, and other senior officials regarding the contamination of fresh canal water in Mandi Bahauddin.

In response to this serious issue, a petition was filed with the Provincial Ombudsman Regional Office, Mandi Bahauddin. During the proceedings, HRPF presented all documentary evidence, and multiple hearings took place.

Subsequently, the Provincial Ombudsman Regional Office, Mandi Bahauddin, strictly prohibited this illegal activity and directed the Deputy Commissioner of Mandi Bahauddin to issue official letters to all relevant departments, instructing them to take immediate notice of this critical

situation. Furthermore, a report on the matter was ordered to be submitted back to the Provincial Ombudsman Regional Office.

Despite limited resources, HRPF continues its mission of humanitarian service and consistently raises its voice on local and regional issues.





HRPF RAISED ITS VOICE ABOUT THE SNGPL SERVICES ISSUES IN THE PUBLIC INTERST.

There were several issues related to Sui Northern Gas in Mianwal Ranjha, including low pressure, unnecessary

load shedding, and gas pipeline maintenance. In this regard, the Human Rights Protection Foundation (HRPF) submitted a petition to the SNGPL authorities, particularly bringing the matter to the attention of the Secretary of Petroleum. Additionally, a petition was filed before the Federal Ombudsman.

As a result, the SNGPL department in Mandi

Bahauddin resolved all these issues in the public interest. The decision of the Federal Ombudsman on this matter is also presented for reference.

HRPF'S EFFORTS AGAINST HUMAN SMUGGLING AND TRAFFICKING.

Human Trafficking from Pakistan: Causes, Consequences, and Solutions

Introduction

Human trafficking has become an alarming issue in

Pakistan, particularly in regions like Gujranwala Division, including Mandi Bahauddin. Hundreds of young men from this region have lost their lives in border crossings and boat accidents, while many others are suffering in foreign prisons. The root causes of this crisis lie in the country's deteriorating economic conditions, lack of justice, and failure to rehabilitate

vulnerable communities. Human traffickers have evolved into organized criminal networks, often having deep connections within government institutions.

This report presents an in-depth analysis of the causes behind human trafficking from Pakistan, its devastating consequences, and potential solutions to curb this crisis.

Causes of Human Trafficking in Pakistan

1. Economic Hardships

Pakistan's weak economic structure is one of the primary reasons behind illegal migration and human trafficking. With rising inflation, unemployment, and limited opportunities, many young people see migration as their only hope for a better future. When legal immigration becomes

impossible due to strict visa policies, they turn to human traffickers, who exploit their desperation.

2. Weak Law Enforcement and Corruption

Human trafficking networks thrive due to weak law enforcement and corruption in government institutions. Many traffickers have strong connections with officials, allowing them to operate freely. Victims often find

themselves deceived, kidnapped, or abandoned in foreign lands without any support.

3. Lack of Awareness and Education

Many people in rural and underprivileged areas are unaware of the risks involved in illegal migration. Smugglers lure them with false promises of jobs and a prosperous life in Europe or the Middle East, only for

them to end up in life-threatening situations.4. Social and Cultural Pressures

In many families, there is a strong cultural expectation for men to earn well and provide for their households. When legal migration is not an option, young men take dangerous routes to fulfill societal expectations.

5. Absence of Effective Rehabilitation Programs

The government lacks concrete programs to support the poor and unemployed youth. Without financial aid, skill development, or employment opportunities, individuals are left with no choice but to risk their lives for a better future.

Consequences of Human Trafficking

1. Loss of Lives in Border Crossings and Sea Journeys

Countless young men from Mandi Bahauddin and other parts of Pakistan have died while attempting to cross borders or through fatal boat accidents. Some of the known victims include:

making them vulnerable to extreme mistreatment.

4. Damaged International Reputation

Pakistan's image has been severely affected by the increasing number of illegal migrants. Many developed countries have tightened visa policies for Pakistanis, making legal immigration even more difficult.

Proposed Solutions to Curb Human Trafficking

- 1. Strengthening Law Enforcement and Judicial System
- The government must take strict action against human traffickers and their networks, ensuring that no official supports them.
- Special courts should be set up to handle human trafficking cases with swift justice.
- The Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) and border security forces must be strengthened to detect and eliminate smuggling networks.
- 2. Economic and Employment Reforms
- The government should create more job opportunities and skill-based training programs, especially in rural areas.
- Investment in industries that can provide employment, such as agriculture, technology, and manufacturing, is necessary to reduce desperation-driven migration.
- 3. Public Awareness Campaigns
- The media, educational institutions, and NGOs should run awareness campaigns about the dangers of illegal migration.
- Victims' families should be involved in these campaigns to warn others about the risks.
- 4. Legal Migration Pathways
- Pakistan should negotiate with countries to create safer, legal migration pathways for skilled and unskilled workers.
- Government facilitation for work visas and labor agreements can help reduce illegal migration.
- 5. Support and Rehabilitation for Victims
- The government must establish a national rehabilitation program to support returnees and their families.
- Psychological support, financial aid, and skill development programs should be introduced to reintegrate victims into society.
 International Cooperation
- Pakistan must work with international organizations like the United Nations,

Interpol, and European authorities to dismantle human trafficking networks.• Bilateral agreements should be signed with destination countries to ensure fair treatment of detained Pakistani migrants. Role of Human Rights Protection Foundation. (HRPF)

has played a crucial role in raising awareness and pressuring authorities to take action against human trafficking. The foundation has repeatedly brought this issue to the attention of high-ranking officials and published research on the matter.

HRPF Chairman, Muhammad Yousaf Badar , has written extensively on the subject, including in his

book Sada Ba Sahara, highlighting the plight of trafficked individuals and the failure of authorities to address the crisis.

Conclusion

Human trafficking is one of the most severe crises facing Pakistan, especially in regions like Mandi Bahauddin. The combination of economic distress, weak law enforcement, and lack of legal migration pathways

forces many to take life-threatening risks. Urgent reforms are needed at multiple levels, from stricter laws to economic improvements and public awareness.

The government, civil society, and international organizations must work together to eliminate this modern form of slavery and prevent further loss of lives. Failure to act now will only

deepen the crisis and tarnish Pakistan's global standing even further.

APPROVAL OF HT/LT PROPOSALS (GEPCO) BY HRPF EFFORTS.


In Mianwal Ranjha, HT/LT proposals were prepared regarding electricity transmission. These included the approval of various transformers, HT/LT


HRPF SOUGHT HELP FROM NATIONAL COMMISSION OF HUMAN RIGHTS (NCHR)

According to the report, a team has been formed for this case, consisting of SHO Qadirabad Mandi Bahauddin, Sub-Inspector Javed Iqbal, ASI Amjad Ali, Constable Adnan Safdar, and Constable Qamar Abbas. This team will regularly update the DPO Mandi Bahauddin on the progress of the investigation.

The Human Rights Protection Foundation is committed not only to serving humanity, upholding human rights, and ensuring transparency in institutions but also to safeguarding its workers and directors. No negligence or complacency will be tolerated in this regard.

The Human Rights Protection Foundation was informed by our esteemed overseas brother, Sahib Ranjha (Hasho Ka), from Saudi Arabia about a distressing case. He shared the painful ordeal of Mureed Hussain, an Overseas Pakistani from Faisalabad, who had been imprisoned in

Al-Shumaisi Jail, Saudi Arabia, for the past 20 years.

The tragic part of this situation was that his case had been settled ten years ago, yet he remained in prison because the Pakistani Embassy had not issued him travel documents/passport.

Upon learning about this, the Human Rights Protection Foundation took immediate action and wrote to the

Honorable Secretary of Interior and the Director General of Passports & Immigration. The matter was then brought to the attention of the Commissioner for Overseas Pakistanis (Federal Ombudsman Cell). The Human Rights Protection Foundation pursued the case rigorously, ensuring that Mureed Hussain's documents were processed.

addressing issues such as pollution, deforestation, and the effects of climate change on human rights. Punjab faces severe environmental challenges due to industrial emissions, agricultural waste, and a lack of waste management infrastructure, leading to contaminated water, air pollution, and health hazards.

Key solutions proposed by Human Rights Protection Foundation. and similar

environmental bodies focus on enforcing stricter environmental regulations, promoting sustainable agricultural practices, and enhancing urban waste management systems. Additionally, HRPF advocates for climate-resilient policies to protect vulnerable

communities, especially rural populations, from climate impacts such as flooding and heat waves.

Expanding green spaces, increasing renewable energy adoption, and supporting reforestation initiatives are also crucial steps suggested to improve the environmental and social resilience of Punjab's communities.

These actions align with international recommendations for developing regions, which emphasize human rights as

fundamental to climate adaptation strategies. By focusing on sustainable development and the protection of basic human rights—including access to clean water, health, and a safe environment—HRPF aims to enhance both environmental conditions and community resilience across Punjab.

Human Rights Protection Foundation, along with

various organizations, has been actively addressing environmental issues in Punjab, where air and water pollution, as well as groundwater depletion, are significant concerns.

- 1. **Air Pollution**: Punjab, particularly Lahore, faces severe air quality issues, with high levels of pollutants like PM2.5. The International Growth Centre (IGC) has collaborated with Punjab's Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to enforce emission standards and promote industrial compliance. Key measures include converting brick kilns to the energy-efficient Induced Draft Zigzag Kiln (IDZK) technology, which reduces fuel use and emissions, and implementing vehicular emissions checks to manage pollution from transportation sources.
- 2. **Water Pollution and Conservation**: Groundwater over-extraction and pollution from industrial discharge have worsened water scarcity. Collaborative efforts with the Judicial Water and Environmental Commission (JWEC) have led to closing polluting industries, installing treatment facilities, and promoting water recycling
- systems in industries and housing areas. Additionally, the construction of rainwater harvesting systems has helped conserve water, and steps have been taken to regulate groundwater use, preventing further depletion.
- 3. **Judicial and Policy Initiatives**: The judicial system, including environmental magistrates, has played a critical role in enforcing the Pakistan

Environmental Protection Act (PEPA) by penalizing non-compliance and strengthening the EPA's enforcement capabilities. The Bhurban Declaration and the Lahore High Court's environmental activism also underscore the role of judiciary in advancing environmental protection.

For a sustainable future, these initiatives are crucial, but they need continuous

reinforcement and community engagement to address Punjab's complex environmental challenges effectively.





ISSUANCE OF PASSPORT TO OVERSEAS PAKISTANI IN JEDDA BY HRPF EFFORTS.

A Pakistani brother in Jeddah was suffering from a severe illness, and his passport was not being renewed, preventing him from traveling back to Pakistan. The Human Rights Protection Foundation Pakistan took strong action, and Alhamdulillah, his passport has now been renewed. InshaAllah, he will be traveling back to Pakistan this week.

Similarly, an Overseas Pakistani from Faisalabad has been imprisoned in Saudi Arabia for nearly 20 years. His sentence has already been completed, but the Pakistani Embassy in Jeddah has not issued him travel documents or a passport. The Human Rights Protection Foundation Pakistan has raised this concern with the relevant

government authorities in Pakistan.

we will ensure his passport renewal and make every effort for his safe return to Pakistan.

It is deeply concerning that our Overseas Pakistani brothers are facing severe fundamental issues abroad, yet no one seems to care for them. InshaAllah, the Human Rights Protection Foundation Pakistan will

Mr. Mureed Hussain, son of Shabir Hussain, hailing from Chak No. 351 JB Tehsil Gujra, District Tohn Tek Singh, has been facing a dire situation abroad. He has been working as a laborer in Saudi Arabia since December 25, 2005. Unfortunately, during his employment, he was wrongfully implicated in a case involving the unfortunate murder of a fellow employee. Despite being sentenced by the local court, Mr. Hussain has spent an agonizing 19 years in incarceration.

The provision of travel documents/passports to these individuals will not only uphold their fundamental human rights but also demonstrate the commitment of the Government of Pakistan to safeguarding the welfare of its citizens, both at home and abroad.



MEETING WITH ADDITIONAL DIRECTOR LIVESTOCK MANDI BAHA UD DIN ABOUT ANIMAL DISEASES.

Yesterday, a delegation from the Human Rights Protection Foundation met with the

Additional Director of Livestock in Mandi Bahauddin. Advocate Kamran Hussain Makhdoom was also present during the meeting. The discussion focused on livestock diseases, their prevention, and the availability of medicines. The Chairman of the Human Rights Protection Foundation expressed concern over the lack of budget allocation by the Punjab government for medicines. The matter has been formally presented to higher authorities.

Given the number of livestock and the challenges faced in Mandi Bahauddin, it is essential that relevant institutions provide adequate resources and medicines. If this discriminatory treatment towards Mandi Bahauddin

continues, a writ petition will be filed in the Lahore High Court in the public interest.

We consider it our duty to utilize all available resources for the protection of public rights.





HRPF DEEPLY CONCERNS ABOUT THE MARTYRDOM OF RESCUE OPRATOR.

The Human Rights Protection Foundation has expressed its deep concern to the Chief Secretary of

Punjab regarding the martyrdom of a rescue worker and the death of another person in Mandi Bahauddin.

It is worth noting that Mandi Bahauddin has long been plagued by lawlessness and severe crimes. Recently, in the dangerous smogfilled weather, a rescue worker lost his life due to the absence of reflector lights on sugarcane trolleys and

other trailers. Another person also lost his life. While death is an undeniable reality, the incompetence and criminal negligence of the relevant traffic authorities behind these fatalities cannot be ignored.

This indifference and gross negligence deserve the strongest condemnation. The Chief Secretary of Punjab and the Inspector General of Punjab Police have been informed of this grave situation. We strongly urge the higher authorities to take strict action against this criminal negligence. Immediate enforcement should be ensured to mandate the installation of reflector lights on trolleys. Strict action must be taken against those who show negligence in this matter.

Furthermore, the National

Commission for Human Rights, the Ministry of Human Rights, and various local and international organizations have also been informed of our concerns.



HRPF EFFORTS TO REPAIR THE BANKS OF CANAL BESIDE MAIN ROAD.

The canal banks from Mandi Bahauddin District Complex to Bhojwal have been severely damaged. In this regard, an application was submitted to the Provincial Ombudsman Regional Office in Mandi Bahauddin.

As a result, the Provincial Ombudsman of Punjab issued a decision stating that the repairs along this

road should be carried out on a priority basis in the public interest. The Human Rights Protection Foundation remains committed to upholding human rights and serving the public.



HRPF CONCERNS ABOUT CONTAMINATION OF THE CANALES FRESH-WATER IN Mandi BAHAUDDIN.

The Human Rights Protection Foundation has expressed its deep concern to the Secretary of

Environment Punjab and the Director General of Environment regarding the contamination of the canal's freshwater in Mandi Bahauddin. This pollution is caused by the discharge of sewage into the canal and the disposal of dead chicks by poultry farm owners.

In response, the Deputy Director of the I&S Department, Punjab Environment Department,

directed the Assistant Director of Environment in Mandi Bahauddin to address the issue immediately. Following this directive, the Assistant Director formally informed senior officials about the situation, and show-cause notices were issued to approximately 136 poultry farm owners across the district. Additionally, some cases were forwarded to the Punjab Environmental Tribunal.

Furthermore, social and political figure Muhammad Arshad Lilla recently shared videos exposing how the TMA Mandi Bahauddin is worsening environmental pollution by dumping sewage and rotten city waste into the freshwater canal. In response, the Human Rights Protection Foundation once again raised the matter with senior authorities and subsequently filed a case with the Provincial Ombudsman Regional Office in Mandi Bahauddin. The case is currently being pursued with detailed documentation.

By the grace of Allah, we are fully committed to serving the public interest, upholding human rights, and ensuring transparency in institutions. We will leave no stone unturned in addressing this critical issue.
